





Michigan's Struggling Households, by County









Michigan payroll jobs in three categories: below middle class, lower middle class, and upper middle class and above








In Largest Occupations, Below-Middle Class Wages Dominate

Our Primary Economic Challenges



Too many lowpaid jobs.



Too few with the education attainment to get betterpaying jobs.



Too low talent concentrations to attract highwage employers.



We need to change the definition of economic success from a low unemployment rate to rising income for all.



High-impact policy lever #1:

Increase income and health coverage for today's low-wage workers through an expanded and no red tape safety net.



High-impact policy lever #2:

Prepare all Michigan children for good-paying forty-year careers by making the 6Cs the foundational skills for all students from birth through college.



High-impact policy lever #3:

In addition to current education funding, provide an annual grant for all children in households unable to pay for the basics from birth through college.



High-impact policy lever #4:

Create more high-paid jobs by creating places where people want to live and work.
